VOLUNTEERING AND GIVING BACK

Kiawah Cares Foundation: This is a 501(c)3 charitable organization which supports KICA's community outreach program. Kiawah Cares works with schools, faith-based organizations and other nonprofits that serve Johns and Wadmalaw islands. Fundraising efforts occur throughout the year, with literacy a priority. Kiawah Women's Foundation/Backpack Buddies: This group packs weekend food supplies for over 300 at risk of hunger children in the Johns and Wadmalaw Island elementary and middle schools (90+ % live below the poverty level). They need volunteer helpers for about 1.5 hours/week, and there is an easy online program which lets you sign up to help. There are also fundraisers to help with and to attend. Kiawah Conservancy:

This nationally accredited organization works to protect Kiawah's natural beauty through a variety of conservation efforts including the preservation of 48 properties totaling over 2,270 acres of barrier island habitat. They present a series of nature-focused lectures, support various research projects, and publish a twice-yearly magazine: Naturally Kiawah. Turtle Patrol: May 1 through Oct. 31 is turtle season on Kiawah. Daily, volunteers record data about Loggerhead turtle nests and hatchlings and report findings to the South Carolina DNR. In the summer of 2016, 393 turtle nests were laid on Kiawah. There are

both nesting and hatching patrols. Nesting patrol takes 2-5 hours by truck, and can be strenuous, but people who are not able to walk for long periods can still volunteer. Hatching patrol is a walk of at least one mile on foot. To volunteer call Lynne Sager at 843-670-7063.

Dolphin Strand-Feeding Monitoring: Jointly sponsored by the Town of Kiawah Island and NOAA, this program is administered by the Low Country Marine Mammal Network. Volunteers staff Captain Sam's Spit to gather statistics on dolphin activity and to educate the public about this rare and wonderful animal behavior. Volunteers need to commit to 3-4 shifts a month (each shift is approximately four hours, bracketing low tide) during the summer and at least once a month the rest of the year. Kiawah Island Bird House Monitoring: Volunteers are needed as regular and substitute monitors for the Town of Kiawah Island sponsored bluebird boxes. These are found primarily on the golf courses and need to be checked weekly from March through August. Data sheets are kept regarding number of nests, species, eggs, chicks and fledges and boxes are cleaned after each successful nest. An orientation/training session is held in late February - early March. Volunteers are also needed to help build new bluebird boxes to replace ones that are falling apart. Kiawah-Seabrook Exchange Club: A service club of over 100 Kiawah, Seabrook and Johns Island residents, the Exchange Club publishes a yearly phone directory for the islands which funds charitable grants to numerous local not for profit organizations. They also honor top students at local schools, present the Angel Oak Award to an outstanding local community volunteer, provide flags for our major holidays, support child abuse prevention, and many other local causes. Women Build: Sea Island Habitat for Humanity holds a week-long Women Build event each April when women come together to help build a new home for a needy family. Kiawah ladies typically field a team one or two days during that week. Volunteers perform a variety of construction tasks under trained supervision. Depending upon the work already completed, they might be installing roof trusses, hammering, or installing windows and doors.
