Dr. Anya Benitez is a neuropsychologist at the Medical University of South Carolina. She specializes in the diseases of aging and is a leading researcher on the early detection of cognitive decline and Alzheimer's disease. Her laboratory has made significant advances in the use of observational studies and clinical trials to identify possible causes of cognitive problems in an effort to develop new treatment strategies.

March 28 - The Charleston Symphony Orchestra: Cultural Pillar of the Community

Michael Smith did not plan to be a music executive. His dream was always to play his trumpet in the best orchestra possible, which he did for many years. In 2013, he saw a need that led him to become Executive Director of the Charleston Symphony Orchestra. April 11 - Stopping Hitler's Atomic Bomb
